James Tissot, Sermon of the Beatitudes, 1886-1896, opaque watercolor over graphite on gray wove paper. Better known as James Tissot, Jacques Joseph Tissot (1836-1902) was a French painter, illustrator, and caricaturist. Best known for genre paintings of contemporary European high society, he incorporated elements of realism, early Impressionism, and academic art into his work, which also explored many medieval, biblical, and Japoniste subjects. In 1885 Tissot revived his Catholic faith and devoted the remainder of his life to paintings of biblical events. Moving away from Impressionism and Post-Impressionism, Tissot returned to traditional, representational styles and narratives in his watercolors. Striving for accuracy rather than religious emotion, he traveled to the Middle East to study its landscapes and cultures, which distinguished his Biblical art through its "considerable archaeological exactitude." His series of 365 gouache illustrations showing the life of Christ were shown to critical acclaim in Europe and the United States, before being bought by the Brooklyn Museum in 1900. Their publications in French and English print editions brought Tissot vast wealth and fame.

**CONFESSION OF 1967** Today's Affirmation of Faith comes from the Confession of 1967, an effort of American Presbyterians to articulate the role of the church in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. This confession for the modern world is built around 2 Corinthians 5:19, "In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself . . ." According to the PC(USA) Book of Confessions, the Confession of 1967 "calls the church to obedient action, particularly in response to social problems such as racial discrimination, nationalistic arrogance, and family and class conflict. It sees the life, death, resurrection, and promised coming of Jesus Christ as the pattern for the church's mission today and calls on all Christians to be reconciled to God and to one another."

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL UPDATE

Classes will be offered for three different age groups:

- Children ages three to second grade will engage in faith formation through Godly Play curriculum.
- Children in grades three to five will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. Our current curriculum is derived from the Memoria Press Christian Studies.
- Middle school youth in grades six to eight will study Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living. Youth will explore how they can live out their faith, as Jesus taught, in our modern world. The middle school youth will meet during worship two to three times per month. On the remaining Sundays, youth should participate in the full worship service.

Most Sundays, we will begin Sunday School with a brief opening in the chapel.

On Sundays when Communion is served in worship, the children will return to sit with their families so that they can participate.

#### YOUTH GROUP UPDATE

Middle and high school youth will meet immediately after worship each week until noon in the Youth Group room. Lunch will be provided. Youth Group will not meet on the first Sunday of the month but will instead engage in Service Sunday after worship.


