


Now the festival of Unleavened Bread, which is called the Passover, was near. The chief priests and the scribes were looking for a way to put Jesus to death, for they were afraid of the people. Dorothea Lange, *Migrant Mother*, photograph, 1936. American photographer Dorothea Lange (1896-1965) took this image in Nipomo, California, while working for the Resettlement Administration (later the Farm Security Administration). Using a Graflex camera and large format (4"x5") film, she captured the distant, anxious gaze of a mother cradling an infant as two children huddle close. The photo became an enduring symbol of the Great Depression, illustrating the struggles of migrant farm workers seeking employment in California. The woman remained anonymous until 1978, when journalist investigations identified her as Florence Owens Thompson, a 32-year-old mother of seven. In later interviews, Thompson expressed frustration that Lange never asked her name and that key details were misrepresented—most notably, Lange's claim that Thompson told her she had sold her car tires for food, which her family later denied. Now in the public domain, *Migrant Mother* is housed at the Library of Congress and remains one of the most widely reproduced images in American photography.

Classes will be offered for three different age groups:

- Children ages three to second grade will engage in faith formation through Godly Play curriculum.
- Children in grades three to five will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. Our current curriculum is derived from the Memoria Press Christian Studies.
- Middle school youth in grades six to eight will study Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living. Youth will explore how they can live out their faith, as Jesus taught, in our modern world. The middle school youth will meet during worship two to three times per month. On the remaining Sundays, youth should participate in the full worship service.

Most Sundays, we will begin Sunday School with a brief opening in the chapel.

On Sundays when Communion is served in worship, the children will return to sit with their families so that they can participate.


