



GOSPEL

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

On the next day, when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met him. Just then a man from the crowd shouted, "Teacher, I beg you to look at my son; he is my only child. Suddenly a spirit seizes him, and all at once he shrieks. It convulses him until he foams at the mouth; it mauls him and will scarcely leave him. I begged your disciples to cast it out, but they could not." Jesus answered, "You faithless and perverse generation, how much longer must I be with you and bear with you? Bring your son here." While he was coming, the demon dashed him to the ground in convulsions. But Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, healed the boy, and gave him back to his father.

Titian, *Transfiguration of Christ*, 1560, oil on canvas, altarpiece, Church of San Salvador, Venice, Italy. Considered as the most important artist of the Italian Renaissance, Tiziano Vecellio (c. 1488/90–1576) was tremendously versatile, equally adept with portraits, landscape backgrounds, and mythological and religious subjects. The Transfiguration constitutes a pivotal moment in the life of Christ, in which his divinity is acknowledged. This episode takes place at the threshold between heaven and earth and, similarly, highlights Christ's status as both divine and human. Titian was always aware of conceiving an image in terms of its own environment; the *Transfiguration* is probably one of his most dramatic coups de théâtre. Commissioned as a cover for the famous silver reredos (altar screen) on the high altar of the church of San Salvador, the canvas was grossly over-painted over the centuries to hide damage from being lowered on high feast days. Restoration in 1997 revealed all the dramatic, expressive characteristics of the master's late work.

Classes will be offered for three different age groups:

- Children ages three to second grade will engage in faith formation through Godly Play curriculum.
- Children in grades three to five will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. Our current curriculum is derived from the *Memoria Press Christian Studies*.
- Middle school youth in grades six to eight will study *Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living.* Youth will explore how they can live out their faith, as Jesus taught, in our modern world. The middle school youth will meet during worship two to three times per month. On the remaining Sundays, youth should participate in the full worship service.

Most Sundays, we will begin Sunday School with a brief opening in the chapel.

On Sundays when Communion is served in worship, the children will return to sit with their families so that they can participate.



THURSDAY, MARCH 13, 12:30PM MARGARET MONTET THE FAMOUS BAYEUX TAPESTRY

The famous Bayeux Tapestry is not a tapestry at all, but an embroidery from the Middle Ages! Measuring 230 feet by twenty inches, it tells the story of William the Conqueror's victory at the Battle of Hastings in 1060 which resulted in him claiming the English throne. As an historical document, it also gives the modern viewer clues to medieval warfare, life, and humor. This presentation will describe the history which inspired the tapestry/embroidery, the embroidery's history, and the medieval city of Bayeux where the tapestry is displayed today. Presenter Margaret Montet visited the tapestry/embroidery in December 2023.

Margaret Montet's narratives of place feature music, memoir, culture and occasionally genealogy. Also a college librarian, Margaret holds an MFA in Creative Nonfiction, teaches public speaking, and presents multimedia musiccentered lectures at lifelong learning venues. Her creative nonfiction has been published in many journals, anthologies, and two books: Nerd Traveler (2021), and Brooklyn Family Album (2024).


