

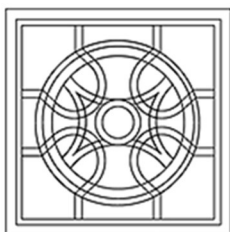

WELCOME!

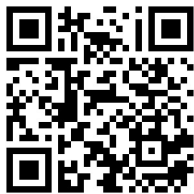
Welcome to the Presbyterian Church of Chestnut Hill!



James Tissot, *The Vine Dresser and the Fig Tree (Le vigneron et le figuier)*, opaque watercolor over graphite on gray wove paper, 1886-1894, from *The Life of Our Lord Jesus Christ (La Vie de Notre Seigneur Jésus-Christ)*. Jacques Joseph Tissot (1836-1902), better known as James Tissot, was a French painter, illustrator, and caricaturist. He was born to a drapery merchant and a milliner and decided to pursue a career in art at a young age, coming to incorporate elements of realism, early Impressionism, and academic art into his work. He is best known for a variety of genre paintings of contemporary European high society produced during the peak of his career. Later in life, Tissot moved away from the Impressionists' and Post-Impressionists' intent to create art that reflected a changing, modern world, and returned to traditional, representational styles and narratives in his watercolors. As part of this artistic effort Tissot traveled to the Middle East in the late 1880's to make studies of its landscapes and cultures, which would come to distinguish his series from contemporary Biblical art through its "considerable archaeological exactitude" in striving for accuracy rather than religious emotion. His series of 365 gouache illustrations showing the life of Christ were shown to critical acclaim and enthusiastic audiences in Paris, London, and New York, before being bought by the Brooklyn Museum in 1900. Two published editions of the illustrations brought Tissot vast wealth and fame.

THE CONFESSION OF BELHAR

The Confession of Belhar emerged from the struggle against apartheid in South Africa in the 1980's. In response to the Dutch Reformed Church's biblical interpretation and ideology in support of racial separation, leaders of the Dutch Reformed Mission Church (which had been formed in 1881 for people designated as "colored") crafted this confession to outline a Reformed theology of unity, reconciliation and justice. When the Dutch Reformed Churches were reunified after apartheid, they offered the Confession of Belhar "to the global Reformed family as a gift," believing that it "issue[s] a call from God to the whole church toward holy action, transformation, and life." Classes will be offered for three different age groups:

- Children ages three to second grade will engage in faith formation through Godly Play curriculum.
- Children in grades three to five will increase their Bible literacy while learning about the richness of our Christian history and faith in a fun, structured setting. Our current curriculum is derived from the Memoria Press Christian Studies.
- Middle school youth in grades six to eight will study *Follow Me: Biblical Practices for Faithful Living*. Youth will explore how they can live out their faith, as Jesus taught, in our modern world. The middle school youth will meet during worship two to three times per month. On the remaining Sundays, youth should participate in the full worship service.

Most Sundays, we will begin Sunday School with a brief opening in the chapel.

On Sundays when Communion is served in worship, the children will return to sit with their families so that they can participate.

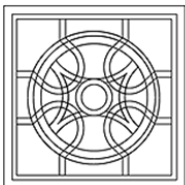
