


Then he said to them, "The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath."

René Magritte, *False Mirror*, 1926-1938, oil on canvas, Museum of Modern Art, New York. René François Ghislain Magritte (1899-1967) was a Belgian surrealist artist known for his depictions of familiar objects in unfamiliar, unexpected contexts, which often provoked questions about the nature and boundaries of reality and representation. His imagery has influenced pop art, minimalist art, and conceptual art. In this painting a huge, isolated eye stares out at the viewer. The anatomical detailing and surface sheen of its left inner corner contrast with the matte, dead-black of the eye's pupil, which floats, unmoored, against a limpid, cloud-filled sky of cerulean blue. Although the areas surrounding the eye's iris are carefully shaded and modeled, giving the illusion of a play of light on a three-dimensional form, the sky displays no trace of convexity; its puffy clouds are beautifully rendered, but not its blue expanse. As a result, the sky appears as though seen through a circular window rather than mirrored in the spherical, liquid surface of an eye.

MOSAICS USING STAINED GLASS (registration required)

Tuesdays, June 4-18, 10 a.m.-1 p.m., \$50, all materials included Students will learn how to design an 8" x 8" mosaic using stained glass. All levels of experience welcome. Selection of imagery is up to the individual, but would be best for designs that are not overly detailed. Consider using a favorite photo, design, or sketch as your inspiration for your mosaic. Come to the first session with an idea for your panel, sized (printed out, black and white or color) to an 8" square. Having a color version of your image on your cell phone as reference will be helpful as well.

- June 4: session #1, 3 hours: demo of cutting stained glass and techniques for mosaics. Transfer design onto wood panel, indicating color areas. Select glass. Get started!
- June 11: session #2, 3 hours: work on cutting glass and creating your mosaic.
- June 18: session #3, 3 hours: finish up setting the glass. Demo of grouting process and "doggie bag to take home" with instructions on how to grout.


