

Delacroix, Christ Asleep During the Tempest, ca. 1853, oil on canvas, Metropolitan Museum of Art. Ferdinand Victor Eugène Delacroix (1798-1863) was regarded as the leader of the French Romantic school. In contrast to the Neoclassical perfectionism of his chief rival Jean-Auguste-Dominique Ingres, Delacroix took for his inspiration the art of Rubens and painters of the Venetian Renaissance, with an attendant emphasis on color and movement rather than clarity of outline and carefully modeled form. As a painter and muralist, Delacroix's use of expressive brushstrokes and his study of the optical effects of color profoundly shaped the work of the Impressionists, while his passion for the exotic inspired the artists of the Symbolist movement. Delacroix painted at least six versions of the biblical story of Christ sleeping during a storm while on the Sea of Galilee. After seeing the painting on display in Paris in 1886, Vincent van Gogh wrote "Christ's boat—I'm talking about the blue and green sketch with touches of purple and red and a little lemon yellow for the halo, the aureole—speaks a symbolic language through color itself."


Date Combined Sunday School for PreK through Grade 5


