



OLD TESTAMENT

1 Kings 19:1-15

Ahab told Jezebel all that Elijah had done, and how he had killed all the prophets with the sword. Then Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah, saying, "So may the gods do to me, and more also, if I do not make your life like the life of one of them by this time tomorrow." Then he was afraid; he got up and fled for his life, and came to Beer-sheba, which belongs to Judah; he left his servant there. But he himself went a day's journey into the wilderness, and came and sat down under a solitary broom tree. He asked that he might die: "It is enough; now, O Lord, take away my life, for I am no better than my ancestors." Then he lay down under the broom tree and fell asleep. Suddenly an angel touched him and said to him, "Get up and eat." He looked, and there at his head was a cake baked on hot stones, and a jar of water. He ate and drank, and lay down again. He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." He said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lordwas not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him that said, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites

have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." 

Daniele da Volterra, *The Prophet Elias*, oil on canvas, circa 1550-1560, Uffizi Gallery, Florence. Daniele Ricciarelli (c. 1509-1566), better known as Daniele da Volterra, was a Mannerist Italian painter and sculptor. He is best remembered for his association with Michelangelo, and his most important works were based on designs made by Michelangelo. Daniele's best-known painting is the *Descent from the Cross* in the Trinità dei Monti (c. 1545). After Michelangelo's death, Daniele was hired to add clothing on the nude figures in the *Last Judgment* in the Sistine Chapel, earning him the nickname Il Braghettone ("the breeches maker").

The first Sunday of the month communion is served in worship and the children will return after Sunday School to sit with their families so that they can participate.




